#### **By-law Number 2021-059**

Being a By-law passed pursuant to the provisions of Section 34 of *The Planning Act*, R.S.O. 1990, as amended to amend the Township of Selwyn Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 2009-021, as otherwise amended

Whereas the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn has received an application to amend By-Law No. 2009-021, otherwise known as the Comprehensive Zoning By-Law, insofar as is necessary to re-zone those lands described as being situated Part of Lot 27, Concession 12 in the Smith Ward (municipally known as 2018 Twelfth Line).

The Zoning By-law Amendment is a condition of consent to sever application B-28-21, which was imposed by the Township. The purpose of the zoning by-law amendment is to rezone the severed portion from Agricultural (A) Zone to Rural Residential Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Six (RR-586) Zone to recognize the proposed residential use of the severed parcel and to provide certain exceptions for the existing buildings on the parcel from the applicable (RR) zone regulations. The retained parcel will also be re-zoned from the Agricultural (A) Zone to the Agricultural Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Five (A-585) Zone to prohibit future residential development in accordance with applicable municipal and provincial policies.

Whereas the Ontario Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c.25, Section 5.3, as amended, states that a municipal power shall be exercised by By-law unless the municipality is specifically authorized to do otherwise;

**Now therefore** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn enacts as follows:

- 1. That Schedule "A" Map 3 of By-law No. 2009-021, as otherwise amended, is hereby further amended by rezoning certain lands situated in Part of Lot 27, Concession 12 in the Smith Ward from "Agricultural (A) Zone" to "Agricultural Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Five (A-585) Zone", as illustrated on Schedule "A" attached hereto and by this reference forming part of this By-law.
- 2. That Schedule "A" Map 3 of By-law No. 2009-021, as otherwise amended, is hereby further amended by rezoning certain lands situated in Part of Lot 27, Concession 12 in the Smith Ward from "Agricultural (A) Zone" to "Rural Residential Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Six (RR-586) Zone", as illustrated on Schedule "A" attached hereto and by this reference forming part of this By-law.
- 3. That Schedule "B" of By-law No. 2009-021, as otherwise amended, is hereby further amended by adding the "Agricultural Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Five (A-585) Zone" which shall read as follows:

Agricultural Exception 585 (A-585) Zone Reference By-law 2021-059

No person shall use any land or erect, alter or use any building or structure except in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 and Section 4.7 hereof, and subject to the following special provisions:

# a) Residential Uses:

Prohibited.

# b) Permitted Uses:

An agricultural use and agricultural buildings.

# c) Regulations for uses permitted in Section b) above:

i)	Building Height (Maximum)	12 m
ii)	Front Yard (Minimum)	30 m
iii)	Exterior Side Yard (Minimum)	30 m
iv)	Interior Side Yard (Minimum)	30 m

- 4. That Schedule "B" of By-law No. 2009-021, as otherwise amended, is hereby further amended by adding the "Rural Residential Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Six (RR-586) Zone" which shall read as follows:
  - 586 Rural Residential Exception 586 (RR-586) Zone Reference By-law 2021-059

No person shall use any land or erect, alter or use any building or structure except in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 and Section 4.12 hereof, and subject to the following special provisions:

# a) Regulations for uses permitted in accordance with Section 3 and Section 4.12.1.1:

- iv) New buildings, structures and additions shall meet the provisions of Section 3 and Section 4.12, as applicable.
- v) "As Existing" shall mean as existing on the date of passage of by-law 2021-059 and as shown on the plan prepared by Elliott & Parr plotted 7/20/2021.
- 5. All other relevant provisions of By-law 2009-021, as amended, shall apply.
- 6. That subject to notice of the passing of this By-law in accordance with the provisions of Section 34(18) of the Planning Act, this By-law shall come into force and effect on the date of passing by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn where no notice of appeal or objection is received pursuant to the provisions of Section 34(21) of *The Planning Act*, R.S.O.1990, as amended.





# **Summary of Application**

The Township has received a complete application for a Zoning By-law Amendment for the lands described as being Part of Lot 27, Concession 12 in the Smith Ward (municipally known as 2018 Twelfth Line).

The subject lands are designated **Prime Agricultural**; and are zoned "**Agricultural**" and "**Environmental Protection** (**EP**)".

The Zoning By-law Amendment is a condition of consent to sever application B-28-21, which was imposed by the Township. Figure 1 illustrates the proposed severance of a surplus farm residence parcel of 1.23 hectares (3.03 acres) from the property situated at 2018 Twelfth Line. The proposed severance has been granted provisional consent by the County of Peterborough. The severed parcel will be zoned "Rural Residential (RR) Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-six (RR-586)" to recognize certain deficiencies with regard to the applicable zoning regulations for the existing buildings on the severed parcel. The retained parcel will be zoned "Agricultural Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Five (A-585) Zone" to prohibit future residential dwellings.

It is my professional planning opinion that the proposal is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) and conforms with the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe (GPGGH) as well as the County and Township Official Plans.

# Planning Analysis for Zoning By-law Amendment File No. C-09-21

# **The Development Proposal**

The Township has received a complete application for a Zoning By-law Amendment for the lands described as being Part of Lot 27, Concession 12 in the Smith Ward (municipally known as 2018 Twelfth Line) (refer to Figure 2).



Figure 2: Location Map

The subject lands are designated **Prime Agricultural**; and are zoned "Agricultural (A)" and "Environmental Protection (EP)".

The Zoning By-law Amendment is a condition of consent to sever application B-28-21, which was imposed by the Township. Figure 1 illustrates the proposed severance of a 1.23 hectares (3.03 acres) parcel from the property situated at 2018 Twelfth Line. The

severed parcel will be zoned "Rural Residential (RR) Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-six (RR-586)" to recognize certain deficiencies with regard to the applicable zoning regulations for the existing buildings on the severed parcel. The retained parcel will be zoned "Agricultural Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Five (A-585) Zone" to prohibit future residential dwellings.

Surrounding land uses include agricultural and rural land uses including rural residential properties (refer to Figure 3).

# **Analysis**

### The Provincial Policy Statement

The 2020 Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) as issued under the authority of Section 3 of the Planning Act came into effect on May 1, 2020. Further, Section 3 of the Planning Act requires that decisions by planning authorities "shall be consistent with" the PPS. The intent of the PPS is to provide direction on matters related to land use planning and development. Within the context of this proposal, certain provisions of the PPS are considered to have direct relevance as follows:

- Section 2.3.4.1 provides that lot creation in prime agricultural areas is discouraged and may only be permitted for certain situations including a residence surplus to a farming operation as a result of farm consolidation provided that:
  - a) The new lot will be limited to minimum size needed to accommodate the use and appropriate sewage and water services; and
  - b) The planning authority ensures that new residential dwellings are prohibited on any remnant parcel of farmland created by the severance.

Peterborough Public Health has provided comments of no concern to the County regarding the servicing of the severed parcel. The proposed zoning amendment will serve to prohibit residential dwellings on the remnant (i.e. retained) parcel of farmland.

I am of the opinion that the proposed zoning amendment is consistent with the PPS.

#### **Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, 2019 (GPGGH)**

The current Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, 2019 (GPGGH) came into effect on May 16, 2019. The GPGGH provides additional and more specific policy direction than provided for in the PPS. The GPGGH generally takes precedence over the PPS to the extent of any conflict.

The GPPGH is centered on the idea of growth management that supports economic prosperity, protects the environment and helps communities achieve a high quality of life in the region of Ontario known as the Greater Golden Horseshoe (GGH). The County of Peterborough is part of the GPPGH plan area as shown on Schedule 1 of the Plan.

The GPGGH directs the vast majority of development to recognized 'settlement areas'. Development outside of 'settlements areas', may be permitted in accordance with Section 2.2.9 which indicates that development in rural areas should be related to the

management or use of resources, resource-based recreational activities and rural land uses that cannot be located in settlement areas provided that they are compatible with the rural landscape and surrounding local uses, can be sustained by rural service levels and will not adversely impact the protection of agricultural uses and other resource-based uses. Section 4.2.6.5 encourages the retention of existing lots of record for agricultural uses and discourages the use of these lots for non-agricultural uses. I am of the opinion, that in the case of surplus farm dwellings, the PPS provides more specific policy that does not conflict with the direction in the GPGGH.

I am of the opinion that the proposal conforms with the GPGGH.

### **County of Peterborough Official Plan**

The County Official Plan identifies the subject lands "Rural and Cultural Landscape". Specific policies regarding the protection of prime agricultural lands, such as the subject lands, are found in Section 4.3.3.2. The policy allowing consents for surplus farm residences is found in Section 2.6.3.4(E)(ii) which states:

Lot creation in prime agricultural areas is discouraged and may only be permitted for:

ii) a residence surplus to a farming operation as a result of farm consolidation, provided that the planning authority ensures that new residential dwellings are prohibited on any vacant remnant parcel of farmland created by the severance.

The proposed zoning by-law amendment will prohibit new residential dwellings on the remnant (i.e. retained) parcel of farmland as required by the County Official Plan.

I am of the opinion that the proposal conforms to the County Official Plan.

#### **Township of Selwyn Official Plan**

Official Plan Amendment No. 3 received Ministerial consent on October 22, 2008. The amendment functions as the lower tier Official Plan for the Township. Section 6.0 (Local Plan Policies) provides detailed strategies, policies and land use designations for planning and development at the local municipal level.




Figure 4: Official Plan designation

Schedule A1 (Land Use Plan – Rural Component) of the Official Plan, designates the subject lands as "Prime Agriculture" (refer to Figure 4). Section 6.2.1 of the Official Plan outlines the applicable policies within this designation. The surplus farm residence policy is found in Section 6.2.1.4(a) which states:

Notwithstanding any other provision in 6.2.1, a consent may be granted to dispose of a surplus farm residence provided the following additional criteria are met:

- i) the dwelling is surplus to a farming operation as a result of farm consolidation and provided that new residential dwellings are prohibited on any vacant remnant parcel of farmland created by the severance.;
- ii) the dwelling is surplus to the needs of the farm;
- iii) the residence will not be required by the farm;
- iv) the separated parcel will not include any more land than is required to support the residence;
- v) the lot containing the surplus residence will have a minimum lot frontage of 38 m. and a minimum lot area of 2,320 sq. m.;
- vi) the conveyance complies with the Minimum Distance Separation requirements of the Provincial Policy Statement;
- vii) the existing building is habitable

The above stated criteria would have been reviewed by the County of Peterborough prior to granting provisional consent. The proposed zoning by-law amendment fulfills criteria i) above by prohibiting new residential dwellings on the remnant (i.e. retained) parcel of farmland.

I am of the opinion that the proposed zoning by-law amendment conforms to the Township's Official Plan.

# Township of Selwyn Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 2009-021, as amended.




Figure 5: Excerpt from Zoning By-law 2009-021

The subject lands are zoned "Agricultural (A)" and "Environmental Protection (EP)" (refer to Figure 5). As previously noted, the Township imposed a condition of the provisional consent that obligates the applicant to re-zone the subject lands. The severed parcel will be zoned "Rural Residential (RR) Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-six (RR-586)" to recognize certain deficiencies with regard to the applicable zoning regulations for the existing accessory structures on the severed parcel. The retained parcel will be zoned "Agricultural Exception Five Hundred and Eighty-Five (A-585) Zone" to prohibit future residential dwellings.

The draft by-law has been attached for your review.

Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board (KPR) has reviewed the draft zoning by-law amendment together with the supporting materials – including the report and memorandum completed by Meridian Planning dated May 11, 2021 and June 15, 2021, respectively; and the staff report dated June 22, 2021.

KPR has noted that a setback of 300 metres between cannabis cultivation / production sites and sensitive land uses is being proposed. It was noted in the report prepared by Meridian Planning that any use within the Community Facility Zone (i.e., school) is considered a sensitive land use. That being said, KPR has no issues or concerns with the proposed ZBLA, as it is KPR's opinion that the proposed setback from a school facility has been adequately justified. Further, it is noted that there are to be several mitigative measures, including the implementation of site plan control which will ensue that sites will be developed appropriately if situated near a KPR school site.

Being a By-law passed pursuant to the provisions of Section 34 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended to amend the Township of Selwyn Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 2009-021, as otherwise amended

Whereas the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn has initiated an application to amend By-Law No. 2009-021, otherwise known as the Comprehensive Zoning By-Law, insofar as is necessary to establish provisions that apply to cannabis cultivation and processing within the Township.

And Whereas the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn conducted a public hearing in regard to this application, as required by Section 34(12) of the Planning Act, R.S. O. 1990, Chap. P. 13, as amended.

**And Whereas** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn deems it advisable to amend Zoning By-law 2009-021, as otherwise amended, with respect to the above described lands, and under the provisions of the Planning Act has the authority to do so.

**Now therefore** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn enacts as follows:

- 1. **That** Section 2.0 of By-law No. 2009-21 as amended, is further amended by deleting the definitions for *'Cannabis Cultivation Indoor'* and *'Cannabis Cultivation Outdoor'* and replacing these definitions with the following:
  - i) "Cannabis Cultivation Indoor" means the growing of cannabis within a wholly enclosed building or structure, for medical or recreational purposes in accordance with the requirements of a cultivation licence as issued by Health Canada in accordance with the Cannabis Regulations SOR/2018-144, to the Cannabis Act, SC 2018, c 16, the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, SC 1996, c 19 and the Food and Drugs Act, RSC 1985, c F-27, as amended from time to time, or any successors thereto."
  - ii) "Cannabis Cultivation Outdoor" means the growing of cannabis in an open air setting, for medical or recreational purposes in accordance with the requirements of a cultivation licence as issued by Health Canada in accordance with the Cannabis Regulations SOR/2018-144, to the Cannabis Act, SC 2018, c 16, the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, SC 1996, c 19 and the Food and Drugs Act, RSC 1985, c F-27, as amended from time to time, or any successors thereto."

- iii) Agricultural use means a use of land, building or structure for the purpose of animal husbandry, bee-keeping, dairying, fallow, field crops, forestry, fruit farming, horticulture, market gardening, pasturage, poultry-keeping or any other farming use, and includes the growing, raising, packing, treating, storing and sale of produce produced on the premises and other similar uses customarily carried on in the field of general agriculture and which are not noxious but shall not include any other use or establishment as may otherwise be defined herein.
- iv) Agricultural Produce Warehouse means a building or part of a building used for the storage of agricultural produce and may include facilities for wholesale distribution or an accessory retail commercial outlet for the sale of such agricultural produce to the general public but shall not include any other use or establishment as may otherwise be defined herein.
- 2. **That** Section 2.0 of By-law No. 2009-21 as amended, is further amended by adding the following definitions:
  - i) "Air Treatment Control" means a mechanical system designed, approved and implemented in accordance with a license issued by Health Canada for the purposes of controlling emissions and mitigating adverse effects. This includes but is not limited to treatment of particulate matter, odour, and noise emissions discharged as a by-product of a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use.
  - ii) "Adverse Effect" means as defined in the Environmental Protection Act, shall mean one or more of:
    - impairment of the quality of the natural environment for any use that can be made of it;
    - b) injury or damage to property or plant or animal life;
    - c) harm or material discomfort to any person;
    - d) an adverse effect on the health of any person;
    - e) impairment of the safety of any person;
    - f) rendering any property or plant or animal life unfit for human use;
    - g) loss of enjoyment of normal use of property; and
    - h) interference with normal conduct of business."
  - "Sensitive Land Use means buildings, amenity areas, or outdoor spaces where routine or normal activities occurring at reasonably expected times would experience one or more adverse effects from contaminant discharges generated by a nearby major facility. Sensitive land uses may be a part of the natural or built environment. Examples may include, but are not limited to: residences, day care centres, and educational and health facilities."
- 3. **That** Section 3.49 of By-law No. 2009-21 as amended, be deleted and replaced with the following:

#### "3.49 Cannabis Cultivation

#### 3.49.1 Regulations Applying to All Cannabis Uses

The following provisions apply to all *cannabis cultivation* – *indoor* uses, *cannabis cultivation* -*outdoor* uses, cannabis analytical testing facilities, cannabis drug production facilities, cannabis processing facilities, and cannabis research facilities where permitted by this Zoning By-law:

- a) Only the cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing uses of a singular cannabis licence holder may occur on a single lot.
- b) Where private lighting facilities, whether internal or external to any building or structure associated with a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use are provided, such lighting facilities shall be designed to be energy efficient, be directed downwards, and located or arranged to deflect glare away from any adjacent uses, streets and the night sky.
- c) Where a building, structure or land is used for a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use and is located adjacent to a Residential Zone, Community Facility Zone, or Recreational Open Space Zone, a 3 metre wide planting strip shall be provided along the lot line adjacent to the Residential Zone, Community Facility Zone, or Recreational Open Space Zone in accordance with the requirements of Sections 3.35.1, 3.35.2 and 3.35.3 of this Zoning By-law.
- d) Outdoor storage on a lot containing a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use is prohibited.
- e) Notwithstanding Section 3.1 of this Zoning By-law, an accessory structure on a lot containing a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use shall be setback a minimum of 50 metres from any lot line.
- f) Notwithstanding Section 3.49.1 (e), an accessory building or structure located on the same lot as a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use that is used for security purposes, may be located in any required yard and does not have to comply with the minimum front, side or rear yard setbacks of this Zoning Bylaw.
- g) Other than cultivation, all other cannabis-related uses are only permitted within a wholly enclosed building.
- h) The sale of cannabis or cannabis products is not permitted as an accessory use to any cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use.
- i) The establishment of or expansion to an indoor cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use shall be subject to Site Plan Control.

- j) No minor variance to the zoning requirements for a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use shall be permitted by the Committee of Adjustment and shall only be considered by way of a Zoning Bylaw Amendment.
- k) Where a minimum separation distance is required between a cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use and a *sensitive land use*, such minimum separation distance shall be measured from the edge of the nearest building or crop line on the lot with the cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use to:
  - i) Any Residential use to the nearest exterior wall of the dwelling;
  - ii) Uses permitted in the Community Facility (CF) Zone to the nearest exterior wall of the primary building on the lot or in the case of a public park to the nearest lot line; or
  - iii) Uses permitted in the Recreational Open Space (RE) Zone to the nearest lot line.

#### 3.49.2 Regulations Applying to Indoor Cannabis Uses

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this By-law to the contrary, the following additional requirements shall apply to *cannabis cultivation* – *indoor* uses, cannabis analytical testing facilities, cannabis drug production facilities, cannabis processing facilities, and cannabis research facilities where permitted:

- Cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing uses shall only be permitted in new, purpose-built buildings equipped with an air treatment control system. Existing buildings or structures may not be converted or retrofitted for cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing uses.
- b) Any expansion of an existing cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing use or an addition to any buildings or structures thereto must comply with the requirements of this Zoning By-law.
- c) Where permitted, the following provisions apply to indoor cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing uses:

- (\*1) Except where ventilating fans in a wall exhaust into the respective side or rear yard, in which case the minimum side or rear yard setback shall be 25 metres.
- (\*2) Except where ventilating fans in a wall exhaust into the respective side or rear yard, in which case the minimum side or rear yard setback shall be 60 metres.
- d) Indoor cannabis cultivation, production, processing, research or testing uses shall only be permitted by amendment to this Zoning By-law. Any site specific permissions for such uses must include a minimum distance separation from sensitive land uses in accordance with Section 3.49.1 (k) of this Zoning By-law.

#### 3.49.3 Regulations Applying to Outdoor Cannabis Cultivation

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this By-law to the contrary, the following additional requirements shall apply to *cannabis cultivation* – *outdoor* uses where permitted:

- a) A cannabis cultivation outdoor use with no air treatment control system shall be setback a minimum distance separation distance of 300 metres from a sensitive land use in accordance with the requirements of Section 3.49.1(k) of this Zoning By-law.
- b) Cannabis cultivation outdoor shall be setback a minimum of 50 metres from the lot lines of the lot on which the cannabis operation is located.
- 4. **That** Section 4.7.1.2 of Zoning By-law 2009-21 be amended as follows:
  - d) farm greenhouse but shall not include a *cannabis cultivation indoor* use or accessory uses thereto;
  - k) small scale commercial and industrial uses provided they directly relate to the agricultural operation but shall not include a cannabis drug production facility, cannabis processing facility, cannabis research facility or cannabis analytical testing facility."
- 5. **That** Section 4.7.4.2 of Zoning By-law 2009-21 be deleted in its entirety.
- 6. **That** Section 4.8.1.2 (r) of Zoning By-law 2009-21 be amended as follows:
  - g) farm greenhouse but shall not include a *cannabis cultivation indoor* use or accessory uses thereto;
  - r) small scale commercial and industrial uses provided they directly relate to the agricultural operation but shall not include a cannabis drug production facility, cannabis processing facility, cannabis research facility or cannabis analytical testing facility.

#### Information

Council passed the following resolution at its June 22, 2021 meeting:

Resolution No. 2021 – 180 – Cannabis Zoning By-law Regulations

Councillor Anita Locke – Councillor Donna Ballantyne –

That the report from the Manager of Building and Planning regarding the proposed amendments to the Zoning By-law regulations related to the cultivation and production of cannabis be received for information; and

That Council consider the proposed draft Zoning By-law amendment related to the cultivation and production of cannabis within the Township and provide any input into the regulations; and

That the draft By-law and related attachments be forwarded to those residents who have been engaged in this process; and

That a final draft of the By-law be brought back to Council at the July 13, 2021 meeting that incorporates any feedback provided by Council from the June 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2021 Council meeting; and

That the requisite public meeting to consider public input related to the draft By-law be held on August 10, 2021.

Carried.

In accordance with Council's resolution, we are holding a public meeting to consider feedback from the public and commenting agencies and to answer any questions related to the proposed amendment.

Notice of the public meeting was advertised in the Examiner, the Herald, through Social Media, our e-newsletter and directly through email to residents who have shown an interest in the issue.

The purpose of the by-law is described in the body of this report. These proposed changes will apply to regulate the cannabis industry for any new applications from the date that the by-law is passed (subject to appeal).

The Planning Act does not allow the Township to apply new rules retroactively (see section 34, Subsection 9 below), i.e. the Planning Act does not permit a change in the rules mid-stream for an application that is already underway.

#### Subsection 9 of Section 34 regulates that:

- (9) No by-law passed under this section applies,
  - (a) to prevent the use of any land, building or structure for any purpose prohibited by the by-law if such land, building or structure was lawfully used for such purpose on the day of the passing of the by-law, so long as it continues to be used for that purpose;

### **Proposed Zoning By-law Amendment**

The amendment will impact the following sections of the Township's Zoning By-law:

- Section 2.0 Definitions
- Section 3.0 General Provisions
- Section 4.7 Agricultural Zone Provisions
- Section 4.8 Rural Zone Provisions

#### Section 2.0 Definitions

"Cannabis Cultivation – Indoor" & "Cannabis Cultivation – Outdoor"

 Revised to include specific reference to the Federal Cannabis Act licensing provisions to ensure consistency of scope of definition.

"Agricultural Use" and "Agricultural Produce Warehouse"

 Revised to clarify that these definitions are subject to the specific restrictions related cannabis cultivation and production provided for by this amendment.
 For example, a warehouse for the storage and distribution of cannabis would not be defined as an "agricultural produce warehouse" and instead would subject to the provisions of this amending bylaw, eg. no accessory retail to the general public.

"Air Treatment Control", "Adverse Effect" and "Sensitive Land Use".

 New definitions being added to provide for proper interpretation of the amending Bylaw. The definitions used for "adverse Effect" and "Sensitive Land Use" are consistent with those in the PPS.

#### Section 3.0 General Provisions

Section 3.49 "Regulations for Cannabis Cultivation" is being replaced in its entirety with a new Section 3.49 which sets out regulations as follows:

### 3.49.1 – Regulations Applying to All Cannabis Uses

- Only one license holder can operate per lot.
- Internal and/or external lighting shall be efficient, directed downward, arranged to deflect glare away from adjacent uses, streets and the night sky.
- A 3 metre planting strip is required where a cannabis use abuts a residential, community facility and recreational open space zone.
- Outdoor storage is prohibited.
- Accessory structures shall be set back a minimum of 50 metres from any lot line. Regulation 3.49.3 a) provides additional regulations for accessory structures that are used to dry and store cannabis. These will be subject to the 300 metre Minimum Separation Distance.
- Other than cultivation, all other cannabis related uses (storage, drying, packaging) are only permitted within a wholly enclosed building.
- The retail sale of cannabis product is not permitted as an accessory use.
- Amendments to the regulations must be done by way of a Zoning By-law Amendment (ZBA). Minor variances are not permitted.
- A minimum separation distance of 300 metres is required between a sensitive land use and crop lines and buildings within which cannabis is stored and processed etc. Criteria for the measurement of that distance are provided.

## Section 3.49.2 – Regulations Applying to Indoor Cannabis Uses

- Indoor cannabis uses shall only be permitted by way of a Zoning Bylaw Amendment.
- Indoor cannabis uses shall only be permitted in new purpose-built buildings with air treatment control systems.
- Expansions of existing facilities must comply with the Zoning By-law.
- Minimum lot area, frontage, setback and lot coverage criteria for micro cultivation, micro processing, standard cultivation and standard processing facilities have been created.
- Site Specific ZBA must establish minimum separation distance from sensitive land uses based on the characteristics of the site/proposal.

Please note that Indoor Cannabis Uses would be subject to Site Plan Control in addition to requiring a site specific ZBA.

Section 3.49.3 – Regulations Applying to Outdoor Cannabis Uses

 Outdoor cultivation shall be setback a minimum distance separation distance of 300 metres from a sensitive land use and a minimum 50 metres from the lot lines. Accessory buildings within which cannabis is stored, dried and bulk packaged are also subject to the 300 metre setback.

#### Section 4.7 Agricultural Zone and 4.8 Rural Zone

- Deletes previous setback provisions in each Zone as they would be made redundant by this amendment.
- Excludes cannabis cultivation indoor use or accessory uses thereto from the farm greenhouse permitted use.
- Excludes cannabis cultivation indoor use or accessory uses thereto from the small scale commercial and industrial permitted use.

The author of the amendment, Alison Luoma, of Meridian Planning will attend the meeting virtually and will be available to answer any questions for Council and the public.

Our intention is to consolidate the input we have received from the commenting agencies and the public prior to and during the public meeting, and to consider whether or not any modifications to the draft amending by-law are warranted. A final draft of the By-law will be brought back to Council for their consideration at the September 7<sup>th</sup> Council meeting.

## Recommendation

That the report of the Chief Administrative Officer with respect to the Joint County of Peterborough Request for Proposal for a Compensation Review of Council and Staff positions be received for information; and

That the Township of Selwyn proceed to engage Gallagher Benefits Services Group Inc. to conduct the Compensation Review; and

That the 2021 budget be amended to provide funding for this project, in the amount of \$9,665 plus applicable HST, by way of a transfer from the General Government Reserve.

#### Information

The County of Peterborough issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a Compensation Review of Council and staff positions in June. In doing so the County provided the opportunity for the lower tier municipalities to participate in the process. Selwyn, along with five of the other lower tier municipalities chose to participate in the RFP.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP and all participating municipalities were included as part of the Evaluation Team. The highest scoring proponent, Gallagher Benefits Services Group Inc., was also the lowest bid and has been recommended to complete the project by the Team. The total cost for the review for all municipalities is \$80,642.45 (including HST), with the cost for the Selwyn portion of the work being \$9,665 plus HST. This demonstrates excellent value for the work to be completed and it appears that the economies of scale of the joint RFP have provided significant benefit for all participants.

As you will recall significant changes were made to Council compensation in 2019 as a result of the elimination of the 1/3 tax free allowance by Revenue Canada. In addition, the public's expectations of elected officials have continued to grow and evolve over time. We have also experienced significant changes in our staffing requirements and have experienced the challenges of a very competitive recruitment market.

While the Township has undertaken a compensation review internally once per term, we have not completed this type of third-party external review in the past. This is an excellent opportunity to ensure that our compensation levels are fair and competitive for both Council and staff in comparison to other similar municipalities. The review also includes a high-level review of our job evaluation methodology and approach to ensure ongoing compliance with pay equity requirements and job equity principles. The timing of the review will also provide an opportunity for Council to consider the outcome and make any changes deemed necessary to the councillor compensation package in advance of the next election so that this information is available to potential candidates.

## **Financial Impact**

Funding for this project would be by way of a transfer from the General Government Reserve and would be documented by way of a formal budget amendment.

## **Environmental Impact**

There is no significant environmental impact related to the recommendation in this report. The majority of the work will be conducted via electronic means thereby minimizing the impacts of travel and paper generation.

## Information

In addition, the fall of 2021 will also include opportunities to review the impacts of COVID19 and the status of the new Asset Management Plan process.

#### Recommendation

That the report from the Manager of Building and Planning regarding a request to alter a heritage property known as 59 Clementi Street be received for information; and

That Council provide notice to the owners of 59 Clementi Street that their application requesting to alter their property is complete; and

That the application be forwarded to the Municipal Heritage Committee seeking their opinion as it relates to the proposed alteration in accordance with Section 33 of the Ontario Heritage Act.

#### Information

The Township has received a letter and a "Maintenance Plan" from Ed Poleczny and Jackie Ouellette requesting permission to alter their heritage designated dwelling located at 59 Clementi Street. The maintenance plan includes, replacement of soffit and fascia, siding, deck, windows, roofing, eavestrough and downspouts. Both the letter and the plan have been attached to this report.

The structure has been designated as having cultural and heritage value under Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act. Section 33 (1) of the Act regulates that, No owner of property designated under section 29 shall alter the property or permit the alteration of the property if the alteration is likely to affect the property's heritage attributes, as set out in the description of the property's heritage attributes in the by-law that was required to be registered under clause 29 (12) (b) or subsection 29 (19), as the case may be, unless the owner applies to the council of the municipality in which the property is situate and receives consent in writing to the alteration. 2019, c. 9, Sched. 11, s. 11.

In addition, the Act sets out that Council must consult with its Municipal Heritage Committee (MHC) when one has been established.

Several of the proposed alterations will affect the property's heritage attributes and as such require Council's approval.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act, I have recommended that Council forward the request to the MHC. The MHC is aware of the application and is eager to discuss the matter and to provide its recommendation. The final decision, which is to be made by Council, can take one of the following forms:

- 1) consent to the application,
- 2) consent to the application on terms and conditions, or
- 3) refuse the application.

A decision to deny the request or to apply conditions is subject to appeal.

I anticipate that the MHC's recommendation will come before Council at its next regular meeting on September 7<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

## **Financial Impact**

The proposed recommendation has no financial impact on the Municipality.

As demonstrated over the last 6 years that we have owned our house (59 Clementi St.), Jackie and I both have actively maintained this home with a strong commitment to protecting the original heritage features of the house. We know and understand the designated heritage values and have done maintenance work to match and retain these features (like for like). Our current maintenance work does not "alter" any of the existing heritage designated features as all will be repaired or replaced to match existing (e.g., 2/2 windows, horizontal beveled shiplap siding).

This maintenance work represents a significant financial investment required to protect and maintain a safe home for us. It also represents a significant investment in the protection of cultural heritage in Lakefield as we are fully committed to matching and retaining the existing look and style of the house.

We are providing additional information (attached) as requested for you to know exactly what we will be doing to maintain and protect our home. Please let me know if I missed anything. We have photographs that I will send in separate emails to Rob so we don't overwhelm everyone's email. Also Jackie and I, welcome you along with other Lakefield representatives on the Heritage Committee to arrange a visit so that we can show and discuss all the good maintenance work that is planned. I suspect that a site meeting here is the best way to assure you and the Heritage Committee that we are highly committed to protecting and maintaining the heritage features of our home.

It is especially challenging in COVID times to plan and order and do maintenance work to your home so we really appreciate the quick response as this maintenance is needed ASAP to protect our home and heritage value of the property. #### 59 Clementi St., Updated Maintenance Plan Information - July 27, 2021

As the owner/occupants of "The Den" at 59 Clementi St., which is designated as a heritage building, we are informing Council of our urgent need to move ahead with maintenance work to replace the roof, soffit, fascia and siding (see attached photos of current condition). The planned work does not alter existing heritage designated features. It is maintenance work that will match existing heritage designated features (e.g., 2/2 windows and horizontal clapboard siding. This work represents a significant financial investment to protect our home and to retain the heritage value of the house.

Urgent maintenance work (as outlined below) is needed to address a squirrel infestation that are gaining access to the attic and walls of the house through rotting wood soffit, fascia and siding (see pictures inserted below where we have had to remove some of the rotting siding and install hardware cloth to stop access routes used by squirrels. As you are likely well aware, squirrels can pose a significant fire hazard by chewing electrical lines in walls and attics and also known carriers of significant wildlife disease including lyme disease. The proposed maintenance work needs to be started ASAP to ensure our health and safety and completed early fall to protect the heritage value of the building from fall rain and winter conditions.

The work schedule is as follows:

#### **Soffit and Fascia Maintenance** (beginning in mid-August)

- replace rotting fascia boards with pine 1x6" boards
- Remove plywood fascia (rotting and no ventilation)
- Install Buchner 6" Fascia (no rib) (to view product information and colour: <a href="https://www.buchnermfg.com/product/fascia/BMFA1321?color=740">https://www.buchnermfg.com/product/fascia/BMFA1321?color=740</a>)
- install Double 5 Vented Aluminum Soffit (to view product information and colour: <a href="https://www.buchnermfg.com/product/aluminum-soffit/BMST1120?color=740">https://www.buchnermfg.com/product/aluminum-soffit/BMST1120?color=740</a>)
- Supplied by Buchner Maufacturing and purchased from Alf Curtis.
- Removing the rotting wood and replacing with new wood clad with metal soffit and fascia will
  greatly enhance the protection of the roof and squirrel damage.

#### **Siding Maintenance** (beginning 3rd week of August)

- Remove rotting horizontal siding
- Install 1.5 inch comfort board and tyvek
- Install white horizontal siding with a vile with shiplap profile to match existing (Fraser product: <a href="https://fraserwoodsiding.com/products/classic-series/">https://fraserwoodsiding.com/products/classic-series/</a>) purchased locally at Kingdon Timbermart.
- The Fraser product is white horizontal siding that is bevel with ship lap that matches existing white horizontal siding and was applied on the north wall of the house (just after we purchased the house 6 years ago) as the existing boards were rotting and falling apart allowing open access for squirrels to the attic. See attached photos of Fraser siding installed on north side of house to match existing).

Deck Maintenance (both Clementi St. and Smith St side decks to be repaired late fall or spring 2022)

- Remove existing rotting decking
- Replace with 1x3" tongue and groove cedar decking to match existing
- Paint slate blue to match roof colour
- Remove rotting 4x4 posts and install 4x4 newell posts to match existing (existing valance will be painted and repaired to retain existing look and style).

**Window Maintenance** (to be repaired when siding work is being done)

#### Front Bay Windows

- replace rotting window sills and outside trim with pine to match existing style and appearance.
- Paint (white) and or repair (as needed) to retain existing interior 2 over 2 ballast windows with blown glass.

Replace storm windows on the outside with double pane, low e insulated windows mounted in a
pine frame to match existing storm windows.

#### Kitchen and Library Windows

- Paint (white) and or repair existing exterior window frame as needed to retain existing look and style of exterior and interior window frame.
- Replace low e insulated window panes in existing wood window frame (Anderson 1982 windows)
- Retain 2 over 2 window style to match existing.

#### **Roof Maintenance** (September)

- Install 1x4" strapping to existing roof.
- Install metal roofing (slate blue, majestic profile <u>profilehttps://www.havelockmetal.com/product/majestic/</u>) purchased from Havelock metal.
- Historically, metal roofing has been around longer than asphalt shingles that are currently on the house. The Heritage Designation for 59 Clementi does not mention roofing material. Metal roof provides a cost effective way to enhance protection of the heritage building similar to many other heritage homes and businesses in Lakefield that currently have metal roofing.

#### **Eavestrough and Downspouts Maintenance** (October)

- Remove all existing eves trough and downspouts that are not functioning properly and causing rot and damage to existing wood siding
- Install gutter clean hangar (Buchner Manufacturing <a href="https://www.buchnermfg.com/product/APGA6130?color=991">https://www.buchnermfg.com/product/APGA6130?color=991</a>)
- Install rustic blue seamless eavestrough (Buchner Manufacturing and purchased from Alf Curtis).
- Install white downspouts and drainage troughs around entire house to ensure proper drainage away from siding and basement.
- Installation of new eves trough and drainage will greatly enhance the protection of the wood siding and foundation of the home.

We are requesting Council undertake an expedient endorsement of the proposed maintenance activities based on the following:

- the proposed maintenance work does not alter (it matches existing, like for like) the reason or purpose of designation (attached)
- it is regular maintenance and does not fall into the category of alteration or renovation
- delay in maintenance work increases ongoing risk of further damage to the building. The
  proposed maintenance will protect the heritage value of this building.
- delay in maintenance work increases fire and health hazards associated with squirrel infestations.
- owner/occupants have a known history of actively maintaining and protecting the heritage values
  of the building (e.g., previously replacing siding on the north wall or 2 over 2 windows matching
  the existing heritage features of the house that were viewed by CBO and Heritage Committee
  member in a site visit)
- this is a significant investment to protect the heritage house that we have now secured the financial support needed to proceed.
- work needs to begin in mid-August to ensure completion before rainy fall or winter weather sets in.

We are proud and highly committed to protect the heritage of this house and the local community. The maintenance work completed to date demonstrates our respect for protecting and maintaining the heritage character of this house.

Please let us know ASAP if you have any questions or concerns as we will need to move ahead on the maintenance work to ensure our health and safety and protection of this heritage house.

Subject: PUG Contract Extension

### Recommendation

That the report of the Chief Administrative Officer with respect to the contract extension with Peterborough Utilities Group (PUG) for the operation of the Lakefield water and wastewater systems and the Woodland Acres distribution and collection systems be received for information; and

That, Bylaw 2021-060, a Bylaw to authorize the execution of a Memorandum of Understanding providing for a two-year extension to the PUG services contract, be brought forth to the Bylaws section of the agenda for passage.

#### Information

As Council may recall the contract with the Peterborough Utilities Group for the operation of the Lakefield water and wastewater systems and the Woodland Acres distribution and collection systems provides for an automatic 5-year renewal of the contract as of December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021 subject to agreement on the annual price of the contract. A one-year notice period is required to terminate the contract.

Council will also recall that the Water and Wastewater Service Delivery Review completed by Aureus in 2020 recommended the Township further explore the options available with respect to this service area including renewed contract with PUG, seeking competitive market bids and in-house delivery of the services.

Late in 2020 the City of Peterborough commenced a review of their delivery of water and wastewater services and are considering the option of consolidating water services, currently provided by PUG, in-house with wastewater services. If this were to occur an agreement with PUG would no longer be an option. The results of this review are still unknown and it appears that it will be late in 2021 or early in 2022 when any information is available with respect to this potential change.

Given this, a two-year extension of the current agreement with PUG is being proposed. The annual price would continue to be subject to 3% increase over each of the two

years as has previously been in place. The one-year termination provisions would remain intact.

This extension would provide the required time for the Township to understand and review all of its options and prepare for any potential transition of the service. Staff continue to monitor the sector to assess the viability of other third-party service providers and to consider the Township's organizational structure as it relates to this service area and the potential of the in-house delivery option.

## **Financial Impact**

The costs of the water and wastewater services are covered by the rates charged to the users of the systems. There is no impact on taxation related to these services. The annual price for the service would continue to increase by 3% each year as is currently provided for.

## **Environmental Impact**

There is no environmental impact related to the recommendation in this report.

#### **Recommendations:**

That the report from the By-law Enforcement Officer regarding the issue of dogs used for hunting deer and that the correspondence item from Ross Jopling and others noting support for the use of dogs during deer hunting be received for information; and

That Jeffrey Armstrong be advised that the Township is satisfied that the regulatory regime currently in place through the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) is sufficient to manage the issue.

#### Information

Council considered a letter from Jeffrey Armstrong requesting that the Township consider passing a by-law that would regulate the use of dogs for hunting deer at its June 8<sup>th</sup> meeting which resulted in the following resolution:

That the correspondence from Jeffery Armstrong related to the use of dogs for deer hunting be received for information; and that staff conduct some further research on this topic and provide follow-up information for Council's consideration.

In accordance with Council's direction, we researched the matter and have established that there is an existing system in place that regulates dogs for hunting deer. In the course of my research, I corresponded with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF Fish and Wildlife) who advised that Section 25 of the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act regulates the use of dogs for hunting deer as follows:

#### **Hunting with dogs**

**25** (1) A person shall not use or be accompanied by a dog while hunting big game, except under the authority of a licence issued in respect of that dog and in accordance with the regulations. 2009, c. 33, Sched. 22, s. 2 (14); 2012, c. 8, Sched. 16, s. 4 (1).

The regulation prescribes that a person (hunter) is permitted to use a dog to hunt deer (during the deer season), subject to, among other things, each dog being licenced by the MNRF.

Staff at the MNRF have advised that "In the event of trespass issues for dogs hunting or chasing wildlife, or any other suspected violation, we ask that the person call the MNRF Tips line to have a Conservation Officer respond and assess the situation specifically and determine if an offence has been committed and respond accordingly."

We have reviewed the hunting regulations related to White-Tailed Deer and have established that the use of dogs is permitted in our Wildlife Management Unit (WMU 74A) during the hunting season (November 1<sup>st</sup> to the 14<sup>th</sup> in 2021). During the closed season, dogs are not permitted to run at large in areas that are inhabited by big game.

In addition to the provisions of the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, the Township's Animal Control By-law also prohibits animals from being at large on the lands of any other person. Technically, if the dogs are trespassing on property where permission has not been granted, the dog owner is also violating the Township's Animal Control By-law.

As Council is aware, the enforcement of the Township's Animal Control By-law is currently carried out by the Peterborough Humane Society under contract. I have discussed their approach to managing complaints they receive about hunting dogs at large during the deer season (November 1 to November 14 in 2021). It is their policy to forward such complaints to the MNRF as "that falls under the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act which is enforced by their conservation officers."

In addition to the letters we received from Mr. Armstrong expressing concern with the activity, we received letters from Ross Jopling one of which has been signed by numerous people, expressing support for the use of dogs for hunting deer.

Hunting deer with dogs during the deer hunting season is common practice that is permitted in our wildlife management unit. The practice is regulated, requires licencing and is enforced by Conservation Officers employed by the MNRF, and as such, sufficient regulations and enforcement provisions exist to address any concerns as they arise during the 14 day shotgun hunting season. It is not recommended that the Township adopt any additional measures to regulate the activity.

We enquired with the MNRF as to how the prohibition against the use of dogs in certain WMU's was established. They provided some principles that apply generally, with some exceptions that would have informed the decision as to where to permit and prohibit the use of dogs. They noted that they believe that the current provisions have been in place since 1974.

## **Financial Impact**

There are no financial implications related to the proposed recommendation.

#### Recommendation

That the report of the Manager of Community and Corporate Services/ Clerk regarding the Water Street Construction project be received for information; and

That authorization be given to proceed with the further archeological study requirements and any design updates to the engineering plans impacted by the archeological study and that any additional costs related to the additional works be included in an upcoming budget amendment report.

#### Information

A tender was issued on May 27, 2021 for the Water Street reconstruction project. Four bids were received for the project. Prior to the issuance of the tender, a Stage 1 archeological assessment was also underway due to the presence of the pioneer cemetery located at Christ Church Community Museum. The Stage 1 assessment involves reviewing existing records to determine the probability of archeological findings. Shortly after the submission of the tenders, the preliminary research completed by the archeologist has confirmed that there may be unmarked burials in the area of Christ Church. The archeologist has advised that a Stage 2 archeological assessment is required in the area within the road allowance adjacent to Christ Church and Hendren's Funeral Home (Hendren's Funeral Home was formerly part of the Christ Church site). The Stage 2 assessment would involve shovel testing along the lakeward side of Water Street. Upon completion of the Stage 1 and 2 assessments, the archeologist must submit a project information form to the Ministry of Heritage, Sport, Tourism, Culture Industries. It is expected that this work would be completed this fall.

Given the unknowns related the archeological work, the tender will be cancelled. This will allow sufficient time to have a better understanding of the archeological findings in order to make an informed decision about the scope of work and final design. Once the scope of work can be finalized based on the archeological assessment, the design and tender documents can be re-adjusted and the tender can be re-issued. This means that the project cannot commence this summer as expected. It is expected (pending results of the archeological assessment) that the tender could be issued later this year with works to commence in 2022.

Council will be updated as part of the 2022 Capital Budget planning meeting to outline next steps and a new timeline based on the archeological findings.

### **Environmental Impact**

Consultation has been underway with necessary approval bodies for the work (ORCA, TSW, etc...). Consultation with Curve Lake First Nation has also been taking place. In addition, a Stage One Archeological Assessment is underway, and a Stage 2 Archeological Assessment will also commence soon, to review the area adjacent to the Christ Church Community Museum due to the presence of a pioneer cemetery at this location.

## **Financial Impact**

The budget currently includes costs of \$44,903 related to the design component of the Water Street project. Approximately \$41,266 in costs have been incurred to date. \$31,425.00 in costs are estimated to complete the following additional works:

Stage 1 and 2 archeological assessment

- Shovel testing (includes monitoring costs and asphalt removal)
- Design updates as a result of archeological assessment findings (reconfiguration of curbing, grading, storm water and water main systems)
- Re-tendering process

It is proposed that any net additional costs related to the study findings and design updates be included in an upcoming budget amendment report. Funding sources will include AMO Gas Tax, OMPF and transfers from the Lakefield Water & Sewer reserves respectively

Being a By-law to amend By-law 2004-24, a by-law to exempt certain retail establishments located in the Township of Selwyn from the provisions of the Retail Business Holidays Act pursuant to the tourism criteria

**WHEREAS** the Retail Business Holidays Act, R.S.O., 1990 c. R.30, Section 4 (1) as amended, states that a municipality may by By-law permit retail business establishments in the municipality to be open on holidays for the maintenance or development of tourism; and

**WHEREAS** the Council of the Township of Smith-Ennismore-Lakefield passed By-law 2004-24 on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of March, A.D., 2004, to exempt certain retail establishments from the provisions of the Retail Business Holidays Act pursuant to the tourism criteria; and

**WHEREAS** the Council deems it necessary to amend By-law 2004-24, by amending Schedule "A" forming part of this By-law; and

**WHEREAS** the Council is satisfied that 1866811 Ontario Limited, Hayley's Hidden Treasures, and Buckhorn Foodland complies with the Tourism Criteria pursuant to O. Reg. 711/91 and deems it essential that it be exempt from the provisions of the Retail Business Holidays Act R.S.O., 1990 c. R.30, as amended, for the maintenance and development of tourism; and

WHEREAS the Council deems it advisable to remove the following businesses from Schedule A, as they are no longer in business: The Brown Canoe Company; Furniture Discounters; Looney Sisters; U\$ave Department Store; The Treasure Chest; Cedar Ridge Alpaca Boutique; Lifestyle Footwear by Sunblockers; and Tribal Voices.

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Selwyn **HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS**:

1. That Schedule "A' of By-law 2004-024 be replaced by the following:

Pursuant to the Retail Business Holidays Act, R.S.O., 1990 c. R.30, Section 4 (1), as amended, and the enactment of By-law 2004-24, the retail businesses as outlined in Column 1 are hereby permitted to be open on the statutory holidays as outlined in Column 2.

- Hayley's Hidden Treasures, to allow the business to be open on the New Year's Day, Family Day, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, Victoria Day, Canada Day, Labour Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day statutory holidays;
- Buckhorn Foodland, to allow the business to be open on the New Year's Day, Family Day, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, Victoria Day, Canada Day, Labour Day, and Thanksgiving Day statutory holidays; and

Further that the following businesses that are no longer in operation be removed from Schedule A of By-law 2004-024, as amended: The Brown Canoe Company; Furniture Discounters; Looney Sisters; U\$ave Department Store; The Treasure Chest; Cedar Ridge Alpaca Boutique; Lifestyle Footwear by Sunblockers; and Tribal Voices; and

Further that Schedule A of By-law 2004-024 be updated to reflect all relevant amendments.

#### Information

In 2004, the Township passed a By-law allowing certain businesses in the Township to be exempt from the Retail Business Holidays Act which regulates the closure of certain retail businesses on statutory holidays. Under the Act, municipalities may pass exemptions to a retail business under the tourism criteria by passing a By-law. Exemptions are considered upon written request.

#### Businesses that are exempt

The Retail Business Holidays Act allows for certain businesses to remain open on statutory holidays due to the nature and size of their business. Examples of these businesses are:

- Small Stores (no more than 3 staff, <2,400 sq. ft., limited product availability food, tobacco, antiques, handicrafts)
- Pharmacies (primarily pharmaceutical/therapeutic/hygienic/cosmetic products, <7,500 sq. ft.)</li>
- Special Services (gasoline, nurseries & garden supplies, fresh fruit & vegetables between April 1 – November 30)

The following businesses have submitted written requests to seek exemption from the RBHA, under the tourism criteria to be open of certain statutory holidays.

#### Stuff

1866811 Ontario Limited (Operating as Stuff) has submitted a request for exemption. 1866811 Ontario Limited (Operating as Stuff) operates at 49 Queen Street in Lakefield. Their operation attracts many tourists contributing to the development of tourism in our municipality. They operate seven days per week and have requested an exemption to be open on Family Day, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, Victoria Day, Canada Day, Labour Day and Thanksgiving Day.

#### Hayley's Hidden Treasures

Hayley's Hidden Treasures has submitted a request for exemption. Hayley's Hidden Treasures operates at 25 Queen Street in Lakefield. They recently opened their retail store in the spring of 2021 during the COVID-19 lockdown, and they are hoping to build their sales and recognition over the coming year. They hope that their operation will attract many tourists contributing to the development of tourism in our municipality. They operate five days per week and have requested an exemption to be open on New Year's Day, Family Day, Good

Friday, Easter Sunday, Victoria Day, Canada Day, Labour Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

#### **Buckhorn Foodland**

Buckhorn Foodland has submitted a request for exemption. Buckhorn Foodland operates at 3329 Buckhorn Rd in Buckhorn. Their operation provides groceries and supplies to residents, visitors and tourists contributing to the development of tourism and economy within our municipality. They operate seven days per week and have requested an exemption to be open on New Year's Day, Family Day, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, Victoria Day, Canada Day, Labour Day, and Thanksgiving Day.

#### Businesses no longer in operation as of August 10, 2021

There are eight businesses that are currently listed on Schedule A of By-Law 2004-024 that are no longer in operation. They are not required to be listed on the Retail Business Holidays Act By-Law and should be removed. The businesses are: The Brown Canoe Company; Furniture Discounters; Looney Sisters; U\$ave Department Store; The Treasure Chest; Cedar Ridge Alpaca Boutique; Lifestyle Footwear by Sunblockers; and Tribal Voices.

The new OLT will help reduce delays and make the land dispute resolution process more efficient by creating a single forum to resolve disputes faster by eliminating unnecessary overlap between cases.

# July 21 Board of Health Summary

#### **COVID-19 Update**

The current state of the outbreak reflects a great improvement over the past two weeks. The case incidence rate now stands at 1.4 cases per 100,000, which is lower than the provincial rate of 7 cases per 100,000. There is one active outbreak locally in a congregate living setting, it has two cases and is stable. As of July 21, 78% of eligible local residents have their first dose, and 63.3% are fully vaccinated. Attendance at mass immunization clinics is starting to decrease, so PPH is transitioning to new, more targeted methods of vaccinating residents, including pop-up clinics and relying on pharmacies and primary care physicians/Nurse Practitioners to vaccinate their patients. Other options being considered include mobile clinics and drive-through clinic models. The province has set an aspirational target of a 90% vaccination rate for everyone 12 years+ based on the more transmissible Delta variant. PPH emailed 14,000 residents with appointments in August and later to ask them to move up their appointment into July. Time is of the essence to increase vaccination rates and achieve herd immunity and protect our community.

#### **PPH Recovery Plan**

PPH has begun developing a framework to guide its recovery efforts once the COVID-19 emergency response subsides. COVID-19 is expected to become an ongoing piece of public health work, however, the recovery plan will help PPH to balance this with the return of public health programs and services reduced or suspended during the pandemic. The recovery plan also describes how PPH intends to "build back better" in order to address local public health priorities while COVID-19 transitions from a pandemic virus into an endemic virus. The phases of the plan are organized around three key themes: restoration, reconstruction, and reimagining. The recovery plan will also focus on addressing health equity needs in the community. The timeframe of this plan is expected to extend from the summer to the end of 2021, however, this will depend on the emergency response which may have to be extended because of the Delta variant.

#### **Unfunded Public Health Programs**

Public Health Standards yet are not funded through the province. Unfunded programs include the enforcement of Menu Labelling regulations, the Child Visual Health and Vision Screening protocols and inspections of Consumption and Treatment Services sites. Unfortunately, local public health agencies (LPHAs) have limited capacity to implement them without a supporting budget. With the anticipated return to regular programs and services in the upcoming fall and winter and the ongoing demands of COVID-19 response, it will be critical that programs that have not been operating for the past 16 months respond to the gaps and inequities created or exacerbated during the pandemic. The addition of new mandates must not jeopardize the prioritization of programs and services that are intended to reduce health inequities and are evidence based. The Board passed a motion to send correspondence outlining this situation to the Minister of Health, with copies to the Premier of Ontario, Ontario Chief Medical Officer of Health, local MPPs, the Association of Local Public Health Agencies (alPHa) and Ontario Boards of Health.



#### Recommendation

"That the Finance and Audit Committee, having considered Report 2021-115, 'Municipal Court Managers' Association / POA Advocacy' recommend that County Council request the Attorney General of Ontario to halt the proclamation of the Early Resolution reforms included in Bill 177 Stronger Fairer Ontario Act and take immediate action to streamline and modernize this section of the legislation by making it easier and more convenient for the public and prosecutors to engage in resolution discussions and by making it more effective and efficient to administer early resolution proceedings for Part I and Part II offences in the Provincial Offences Court; and

**Further That** the Committee recommend that County Council request the Attorney General of Ontario to enact changes to the Provincial Offences Act and any related regulations to permit the prosecutor and defendant or legal representative to agree, at any stage of a proceeding, to a resolution in writing for proceedings commenced under Part I or Part II of the POA and to permit the Clerk of the Court to register the court outcome immediately upon receipt of the written agreement without requiring an appearance before a justice of the peace; and

**Further That** the Committee recommend that County Council request the Ministry of Transportation in consultation with Municipalities consider suspending (temporarily) the imposition of demerit points for persons who pay their ticket in cases where they have no previous relevant convictions; and

**Further That** the Committee recommend that County Council direct staff to forward a copy of this resolution to the Ministry of the Attorney General, MPP David Piccini (Northumberland – Peterborough South), and all Ontario municipalities."

#### **Purpose**

Immediate regulatory and legislative changes are critical to delivering services to the public by putting in place the most modern, efficient, and effective justice system attainable.

The proposed Early Resolution reforms in Bill 177 Stronger, Fairer Ontario Act do not fully support the objectives of the Ministry of the Attorney General pertaining to creating a modernized and efficient justice system. These changes create procedural barriers that prevent reasonable and effective access to court procedures by replacing a simplified process currently in place with a complex lengthy process.

#### **Background**

Northumberland County is not currently opted into the formal Early Resolution process as provided for in the Provincial Offences Act (POA). Early Resolution discussions occur informally, scheduled with the Prosecution Team for all defendants (or their agents) who indicate option 3 (Trial) in response to a Part I (or Part II) charge.

The existing Early Resolution legislation (formal process) provides persons charged with minor offences under Part I (or Part II) of the POA with an option to meet with the prosecutor to resolve matters without the necessity of a trial proceeding. The informal early resolution regime has largely been successful in Northumberland County; providing timely access to justice and being the first POA proceedings to resume during the COVID -19 emergency. The number of Part I matters processed through the early resolution option is approximately 25% of all new charges filed annually and the resolution rate (pre-Trial) is approximately 90%. Approximately 20% of charges Fail to Respond and are convicted in absentia, while 55% of charge fines are paid without a Resolution Meeting or Trial.

The level of public participation in exercising an Early Resolution option in Northumberland County is a clear indication that whether opted into the formal Early Resolution process, or not, the rules under the existing Early Resolution section of the POA are easy for the public to understand and provides access to the justice system for minor offences.

#### Consultations

The Municipal Court Managers Association (MCMA) has conducted a detailed review of the impact the proposed changes will have on administrative processes and resources. The Bill

177 changes to the formal Early Resolution section of the POA will increase processing steps from the existing 15 administrative processes to over 70 processes. This represents an increase in processes of over 400%. Although Northumberland County has digitized and modernized administrative processes to permit the defendant to file their request digitally, the POA court remains dependent upon the Province's antiquated adjudicative case management system (ICON). Given the lack of a modern adjudicative case management system, the impact of the additional and complex legislative processes under the proposed changes to the Early Resolution section of the POA would likely require additional full time Court Clerks to administer the proposed lengthy and complex early resolution process, should Northumberland County choose to opt into the formal Early Resolution process to take advantage of proposed efficiencies in the legislation.

Simplifying the POA to provide for a more efficient, effective justice system with more convenience and proportionate options to the public for minor offences under Part I of the POA, should not require an increase in processes. Permitting any (formal or informal) early resolution meeting to be held in writing and permitting the filing of written agreements between the prosecutor and defendant to be registered administratively as a court outcome by the Court Clerk immediately provides an accessible streamlined efficient and modern court system to the public.

#### Legislative Authority/Risk Considerations

The current legislative framework for formal (opted-in) Early Resolution consists of one (1) section with 27 subsections or paragraphs supported by approximately 15 administrative processes. This legislative framework permits a defendant to request a meeting with the prosecutor, request a change to the appointment date once, attend a meeting with the prosecutor and have the outcome of the early resolution meeting recorded by the court on the same day as the meeting.

The proposed changes to the Early Resolution section of the POA under Bill 177 creates a more complex legislative framework for formal Early Resolution process, with five (5) sections and 43 subsections, paragraphs or subparagraphs. This represents an approximate 60% increase to the number of rules.

# **Discussion/Options**

Operational pressures that existed prior to the pandemic have become more pronounced and need to be met with legislative reforms to enable timely recovery of Provincial Offences Courts

POA Courts has long advocated for legislative reforms streamlining and modernizing Provincial Offences Courts in support of equitable and timely access to justice. Immediate regulatory and legislative changes are critical to delivering services to the public by putting in place the most modern, efficient, and effective justice system attainable. The attached MCMA request seeks to align and validate the POA courts position on the following legislative barriers:

1. Halting the proclamation of the Early Resolution reforms included in Bill 177 and requesting to take immediate action to streamline and modernize this section of the

legislation. Under the proposed amendment, complex time periods and rules will be introduced including a redundant abandonment period, and delay in recoding of court outcomes which will result in multiple defendant appearances.

- 2. Enact changes to the *Provincial Offences Act* and any related regulations to permit the prosecutor and defendant or legal representative to agree, at any stage of a proceeding, to a resolution in writing. By so conserving court time and judicial resources.
- 3. Ministry of Transportation in consultation with municipalities consider suspending (temporarily) the imposition of demerit points for persons who pay their ticket in cases where they have no previous relevant convictions.

Throughout 2020, three separate orders were issued by the Ontario Court of Justice and the Province adjourning all court matters, suspending all *Provincial Offences Act* timelines and later extending these timelines into 2021.

The Chief Justice of Ontario and the Province of Ontario issued separate emergency orders in response to the pandemic throughout 2020 directly impacting Court Services operations.

A set of orders issued by the Chief Justice of Ontario and the Province built on each other and affected the legislative timelines under the *Provincial Offences Act*, meaning that the typical timeframe to respond to a ticket or other court matters governed by the *Provincial Offences Act* no longer applied. The orders extended timelines from March 16, 2020 through to and including February 26, 2021.

Simultaneously, the Chief Justice of Ontario also issued a set of orders that adjourned all court matters from March 16, 2020 until January 25, 2021. This resulted in postponing of over 2,000 trial matters until 2021, at the earliest. As part of court recovery, the Chief Justice advised Provincial Offence Courts that non-trial matters could go ahead by audio hearings by September 28, 2020 and that the resumption of remote trials could go forward as early as January 25, 2021, dependent on local judicial approval and court readiness. In-person trials would continue to be adjourned until the court schedule is approved by the Regional Senior Justice of the Peace, and all health and safety measures have been implemented.

The recovery of Provincial Offence courts was impeded by lack of timely direction from the Province concerning the resumption of services. While the provincial objective was to provide a consistent approach to the resumption of Provincial Offences Courts, priority was given to resuming Criminal Court operations. This often resulted in changing timelines and direction. Coupled with the existing issue of limited judicial resources which was intensified throughout the pandemic, Court Services could not effectively respond to the growing volume of pending cases which directly impacted the public's access to justice.

#### Bill 177 aims to modernize and streamline the Provincial Offences Courts

Legislative amendments to the *Provincial Offences Act* were passed by the Ontario Legislature in December 2017 under Schedule 35 of Bill 177 *Stronger, Fairer Ontario Act*. These amendments include reforming of the Early Resolution process, improving the collection of default fines, and expanding the powers of the clerk of the court. However, the proposed Early

Resolution reforms came short as they do not fully support the objectives of the Ministry of the Attorney General pertaining to creating a modernized and efficient justice system.

In December 2019, the Ministry of the Attorney General advised that it intends to implement Bill 177 amendments through a phased approach. To date the Attorney General has only proclaimed and implemented section 48.1 allowing for use of certified evidence for all Part I proceedings. The rest of Bill 177 amendments are scheduled to be proclaimed later in 2021.

# Bill 177 reforms to the legislated Early Resolution process will prevent reasonable and effective access to court procedures by creating a complex and lengthy process

Early Resolution is an optional program Provincial Offences Courts can offer allowing defendants who opt to dispute their charges to request a meeting with a prosecutor to resolve the charges prior to a trial.

Under the proposed amendment, when a defendant attends a meeting with the prosecutor, the outcome is not recorded by the court immediately and there is a myriad of rules to navigate that result in a court outcome. For example, depending on the agreement, a defendant may have to appear before a Justice of the Peace to register the agreement and there are potential additional appearances required by the defendant and the prosecutor before an outcome is registered by the court. In addition, there are multiple complex time periods and myriad of rules including a redundant abandonment period before an outcome is registered. The inclusion of a proposed abandonment period is redundant as fairness and administrative of justice principles already exist in other sections of the *Provincial Offences Act* including the right to appeal a conviction or a sentence. The complexity of the numerous additional rules will not be easily understood by the public and will hinder access to justice.

Early Resolution process could aid in municipal Provincial Offences Court recovery if the section amendments were edited to make it easy and more convenient for the public and prosecutors to engage in resolution discussions. Northumberland County Court Services would reconsider offering a formal Early Resolution option if the Ministry of the Attorney General were to make it more effective and efficient to administer Early Resolution proceedings.

# Closure of courts due to the pandemic resulted in a decrease in fine payments and increased pending caseload

The extension of *Provincial Offences Act* timelines, along with the continued closure of court hearings impacted many of Court Services operational drivers. While court front counters were reopened in 2020 to provide essential administrative services, the ability to process charges and to address pending caseload was greatly impeded.

In turn, court revenue was impacted by operational instabilities such as, extension of the requirement to pay and defaulting of a fine. It is important to note that this is considered a deferred revenue as all outstanding fines are debt to the Crown owed in perpetuity and never forgiven. The ability to collect on debt diminishes the older a fine becomes.

There is an understanding that defendants request trials to seek resolutions that reduce demerit points. If demerit points were suspended for a period for those acknowledging their guilt and

paying the ticket, it may encourage defendants to pay their traffic ticket, thus reducing trial requests and pressures faced by trial courts. Details such as the time period for offences to which this would apply, what to do if a person receives multiple tickets, as well as determining whether a person without any convictions within 3 or 5 years of payment is to be treated as a first offender could be determined by the ministry.

#### **Financial Impact**

The recommendations contained in this report have no financial impact.

#### **Member Municipality Impacts**

Legislative change allowing any (formal or informal) early Resolution Meeting to be held in writing and permitting the filing of written agreements between the prosecutor and defendant to be registered administratively as a court outcome by the Court Clerk would benefit Member Municipalities in their Part II/Bi-Law proceedings in alignment with County Part I and II Early Resolution Proceedings.

#### **Conclusion/Outcomes**

In response to a the MCMA request for Joint Advocacy on behalf of all Ontario Municipal POA Courts, staff request that the Committee recommends that County Council pass a resolution in support for the listed MCMA recommendations.

In response to the increased pressures resulting from COVID 19, MCMA is seeking the support of POA Courts to actively lobby the Province for immediate regulatory and legislative changes. As you know, our ability to respond to Increasing caseload and declining fine revenue is limited. These proposed changes will enable flexibility for municipalities to respond to local pressures.

It is important that we leverage this opportunity to create a modern, efficient, and sustainable justice system that meets the needs of court users. The proposed changes include:

- 1. Halting the proclamation of the Early Resolution reforms included in Bill 177 Stronger Fairer Ontario Act and take immediate action to streamline and modernize this section of the legislation.
- 2. Enacting changes to the Provincial Offences Act and any related regulations to permit the prosecutor and defendant or legal representative to agree, at any stage of a proceeding, to a resolution in writing for proceedings.
- 3. Requesting the Ministry of Transportation in consultation with Municipalities, consider suspending the imposition of demerit points for persons who pay their ticket in cases where they have no previous relevant convictions.
- 4. Make regulatory changes to allow for camera-based offences to be administered through the administrative monetary penalties.

The MCMA board has prepared some templated documents to assist in your efforts. Attached you will find: Draft Council Resolution, draft council report for ER Courts and some key messages to support discussion. We understand that support for one or all may vary depending on individual priorities and appreciate your consideration.



Firstly, I wish to thank you all for the patience you have shown by listening to all of our ideas with respect to both the Old Stone Mill House, and the Hague Peninsula issues.

I am writing this morning because I was struck by the dynamics of council at large, and the expressed opinions of some, especially Mr. Herron, in yesterday's meeting.

I do wish to say that I am delighted to learn that you are all willing to include measures for environmental improvements, as well as to give consideration to indigenous recommendations, as you move forward with the Hague Point decisions. In these days of climate change, it is reassuring to hear that you are including these components into your decision. Thank you so much.

My one very big concern arising from the meeting came from Mr. Herron's strongly expressed opinion that your decision must be good for the township as a whole. While I do agree, to some extent. I am very concerned that by doing so, there is a risk for "loss of identity" with respect to the culture and heritage which exists in the Lakefield ward and which gives it it's own unique charm and appeal. Selwyn Township is not one big homogeneous region. Ms. Locke's opinions and vote seemed to highlight Lakefield's individuality very clearly, an individuality which seemed on the surface at least, to be skipped over by other opinions. Please remember that most who have chosen to live in Lakefield have done so purely because it does have it's own unique blend; and balance; of business, culture, heritage, and environmental sites, which are not available all one single package, in any other part of the township. I venture to say that most residents chose this Village because it's business community blends into Village life as opposed to it being the primary entity, as seen along the main street of Bridgenorth. I would add that this very visible blending of all of life's components is also the reason for Lakefield's appeal as a festival site, as well as to boaters, day-visitors and tourists from near and afar.

These last several days, (and many evenings throughout the summer), when the winds have been relatively calm, and the air heavy with very high humidity, there has been a very visible cloud of smoke/pollution hovering over the whole of Hague Peninsula, even as far south as Deyncourt St. The closer to the campground, the more dense it has been.

For those of you who feel such conditions are only hazardous to the frail, elderly, young, and those with pre-existing medical conditions; as a retired health care worker with many years of experience in respiratory diseases, I would like you to understand that such conditions are hazardous to each and every one of us, primarily because that smoke contains molecules/particles which are a health hazard - no matter who breathes them in - all residents and visitors alike.

To me, this is yet one more reason for having an environmental impact study please. I am sure that with the examples of the wildfires out west, the reality of this hazard will be obvious to you all. Those folks are leaving town to escape the flames, <u>and</u> to find safe, and clean air to breathe. On days when the smoke envelopes Hague Peninsula, it is not pleasant to have to stay indoors at home with our windows and doors closed, just to be able to breathe clean air. Quite simply, it is dangerous to us if we don't find ways to avoid this pollution.

It's obvious that the campground needs more investment and a rethink. However it does not need to be made redundant and returned to its natural habitat. Such action would unimaginative.

The majority of seasonal campers have made the campground cluttered and unsightly, and difficult for others to find a short term site. IMHO public campgrounds and marinas should not be places for campers or boaters to make their cottage. It's public.

As also an owner of a travel trailer, Lakefield Campground needs a major refit with proper roads, level sites, and the addition of sewer. Seasonal rentals should end or at least greatly reduced in number like Cobourg Beach. All trailers should then be offsite during the off season, and the sites re-offered to first come first serve the following season. Shorter stays should be limited from 2-3 weeks like Provincial Parks. These measures would help the campground be controlled and maintained, and attract more campers to the village and its shops. Lastly, boat trailers cluttering up the park make it look trashy. A public park should not store trailers.

I recently inquired about renting a campsite in late September, and I was shocked at the price for something in such poor condition.

From my perspective there are not many campgrounds around that have the appeal that this one has. The beach, boat launch, walking trails are what brings us back year after year.


I hope you consider keeping Lakefield Campground available to people like us and keep Cindy and her staff at the helm.



## AMO Policy Update – AMO Long-Term Care Transformation Advocacy, Expanding Addictions Support, and Free Skills Training for Newcomers

## **AMO Long-Term Care Transformation Advocacy**

The AMO Board is providing recommendations to the government in a number of critical areas to aid with the transformation of long-term care. This advocacy was informed by AMO's Health Task Force, its expert group on the Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission, and by working with AdvantAge Ontario, an association representing municipal homes and non-profit homes.

In July 2021, AMO provided a submission to the Minister of Long-Term Care in response to the recommendations of the Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission Final Report. This submission identifies opportunities for further examination and consultation and provides recommendations on how the Final Report must be used as a platform for discussion around the transformation of long-term care in Ontario. AMO looks forward to continuing to provide municipal perspectives to the Ministry of Long-Term Care.

In December 2020, the provincial government released "A Better Place to Live, A Better Place to Work: Ontario's Long Term Care Staffing Plan". Among other measures, this Staffing Report commits to investing in providing an average of four hours of care to all residents. AMO's submission to the Ministry of Long-Term Care emphasizes that municipal homes must be eligible for full funding for implementation under the right conditions in order to enhance the quality of care and health and well-being of long-term care residents.

The provincial government has committed to expanding new long-term beds and providing support for older long-term care homes to redevelop. AMO's submission to the Ministry of Long-Term Care provides recommendations around application processes, planning and project support, financing, lifecycle funding, rural and remote

municipal home applications and campuses of care, to support successful development and redevelopment of municipal homes.

All three submissions and more about long-term care, seniors and age-friendly communities are found on the AMO website.

# Ontario Expanding Support for Addictions Treatment Throughout the Province

The Ontario government is providing \$32.7 million in new annualized funding for targeted addictions services and support, including treatment for opioid addictions, as part of the Roadmap to Wellness. This welcome funding will help enhance access to evidence-based, high-quality addictions services and address urgent gaps in needed supports across the continuum of care.

This will include support for the Toronto Academic Health Sciences Network, provincial opioid response investments, bed-based investments for adults and youth, and community-based services to support life-long stabilization and recovery.

### **Free Skills Training for Newcomers**

The Ontario government is providing \$7.7 million in language and skills training supports to help 2,700 newcomers impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic start new jobs. New immigrants were among the hardest hit by COVID-19 with an employment loss of 12%, compared to only 4% for the Canadian-born population.

Through <u>19 programs</u> across Ontario, newcomers can gain skills that will help qualify them for in-demand jobs in food manufacturing, health care, web development, and others. The programs will also help employers find the skilled workers needed to maintain and grow their businesses, advancing the province's economic recovery.

#### Chairs' Message to Local Heads of Council

Re: Federal / Provincial Broadband Announcement

Late on Wednesday we participated in a joint video conference call at the request of federal Minister Monsef and Ontario's new Minister of Infrastructure, Kinga Surma.

The Ministers thanked us for our ongoing efforts to advocate for better broadband and then advised that there was going to be a joint federal/provincial announcement on Thursday. It was clear that the Gig project is not part of either Government's broadband plans.

Each of us expressed our strong disappointment with their decision not to support the Gig project and made clear our expectation that we would expect them to fully connect our residents and businesses to the same kind of speeds that the Gig project would have delivered.

Yesterday's announcement by Deputy Prime Minister Freeland, Minister Monsef and Minister Surma is significant and a good start towards their commitment of connecting all households in Ontario. By our count these announcements together will cover some 88,204 households across a variety of municipalities in our region. As best we can determine all the projects announced today are fibre to the home based. We should be proud of our collective advocacy that has pushed both governments fund these fibre to the home projects.

Our advocacy must continue however to ensure that all future projects also deliver at least 1 Gig of speed to our residents and businesses. Those who live in our rural areas deserve the same speeds that urban residents will receive.

And while we are disappointed that a comprehensive EORN lead Gig project is not going to happen we congratulate both Canada and Ontario in making these major investments. Our work over the past 12 years has help connect our residents and businesses when there was no provincial or federal strategy in place. Now it falls to Canada and Ontario to finish the job.

EORN will be monitoring the progress of both Governments to ensure that the right amount of investment is made in our region and that those who have had the most difficulty in getting better broadband won't be last to be served by their broadband projects. And we will need to

direct any questions that come our way either back to the local MP and MPPs since we will have no role to play in the selection of projects or the companies that will deliver them.

Lastly, EORN of course will continue to deliver it \$300 million plus Cell Gap project with its partner Rogers Communications. All work on the project must be completed by mid-2025.

Thank you again for your support and confidence that you have so willingly given to our efforts to secure the best broadband available for our residents and businesses. This has been a truly inspiring collaboration.

## Deputy Prime Minister announces over \$1.6 billion in support for Ontario municipalities through the Canada Community-Building Fund

**Selwyn Township, Ontario, July 29, 2021**— The health and safety of all Canadians are top priorities for the Government of Canada. Communities across the country are on the frontline of the COVID-19 pandemic, and need immediate assistance to ensure their public infrastructure is safe and reliable. That is why the Government of Canada is taking decisive action to support communities and stabilize the economy.

Today, the Honourable Chrystia Freeland, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, announced, on behalf of the Honourable Catherine McKenna, Minister of Infrastructure and Communities, that Ontario has received over \$850 million through the new federal Canada Community-Building Fund (CCBF) for the 2021–22 fiscal year, along with a top-up of more than \$816 million. This top-up more than doubles the amount of money that Ontario communities received through the program in 2020-21, enabling them to carry out infrastructure projects that support the well-being of their residents.

The new Canada Community-Building Fund provides communities with stable and flexible funding for their infrastructure priorities across a wide range of categories. For example, the City of Richmond Hill built the new Oak Ridges Library, a state-of-the-art 19,000 square foot facility that will meet the needs of a growing community. In the Town of Grimsby, funding was used to protect the shoreline which has been eroding due to waves and high water levels. The municipality installed a revetment – a sloping structure made of armour stone and designed to absorb the energy of incoming water, helping to prevent the loss of municipal infrastructure such as road, water and sanitary services.

The City of Toronto and Toronto Transit Commission (TTC) invested federal funding in work that is underway to make more subway stations accessible as part of the larger TTC's Easier Access station accessibility retrofit program. Accessibility upgrades, including elevators, power-operated doors and new signage and wayfinding, funded in part by federal investments were completed at a number of stations.

Fire halls and fire station infrastructure have been added as an investment category for the program. This addition will contribute to the program's objective of building stronger and more resilient communities.

By enabling communities to plan for their current and future needs, and build or improve the infrastructure that will help them thrive through any circumstance, the CCBF is a critical tool that will help ensure Ontario remains among the best places in the world to live for generations to come.

## Nearly 280,000 Ontario residents to benefit from historic agreement to improve access to high-speed Internet

The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted how much we rely on our Internet connections, making access to fast and reliable Internet service even more critical. For too long, many rural Canadians have lacked access to high-speed Internet, impacting their ability to work, learn and keep in touch with family and friends. The pandemic has made addressing this divide even more urgent. That's why the governments of Canada and Ontario are accelerating their investments in broadband infrastructure.

Today, the Honourable Chrystia Freeland, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance and Member of Parliament for University–Rosedale; the Honourable Maryam Monsef, Minister for Women and Gender Equality and Rural Economic Development and Member of Parliament for Peterborough–Kawartha; the Honourable Kinga Surma, Ontario's Minister of Infrastructure and Member of Provincial Parliament for Etobicoke Centre; and Dave Smith, Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry (Northern Development and Mines) and to the Minister of Indigenous Affairs and Member of Provincial Parliament for Peterborough–Kawartha, announced a historic agreement to bring high-speed Internet to nearly 280,000 rural Ontario households in hundreds of communities across the province.

Under this agreement, the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario have partnered to support large-scale, fibre-based projects that will provide high-speed Internet access to all corners of the province by 2025. This historic agreement is being made possible by an equal federal-provincial investment totalling more than \$1.2 billion.

In addition, the Canada Infrastructure Bank is assessing opportunities proposed through the Universal Broadband Fund to provide additional financing on a project-by-project basis toward significant expansion of broadband in partnership with private and institutional investors.

Canada-wide, more than 890,000 rural and remote households are on track to be connected to high-speed Internet as a result of federal investments. At the end of March 2021, 175,000 rural and remote households had been connected to high-speed Internet under projects supported by the Government of Canada. By the end of this year, over 435,000 households will be connected thanks to support from the federal government.

This investment represents a concrete step forward that will move Ontario almost 40% of the way in its ambitious plan to achieve 100% connectivity for all regions in the province by the end of 2025. This investment builds on Ontario's recently

announced <u>investment of up to \$14.7 million</u> for 13 new projects under the <u>Improving Connectivity for Ontario (ICON) program</u>. This will provide up to 17,000 homes and businesses with access to reliable high-speed Internet and builds on a range of provincial initiatives under way that will connect another 70,000 homes and businesses.

Also part of Ontario's plan to achieve 100% connectivity is a recently announced <u>innovative procurement process</u> that is being used to help connect the vast majority of the remaining underserved and unserved communities. Procurement under this delivery model, led by <u>Infrastructure Ontario</u>, will begin later this summer. Together, these initiatives are part of Ontario's plan to help bring reliable high-speed Internet to more communities across Ontario.

Today's announcement builds on the progress the governments of Canada and Ontario have already made to improve critical infrastructure in Ontario. This includes leveraging over \$30 billion in federal, provincial and partner funding for the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP). This investment supports over 265 local transit projects; 140 projects in rural and northern areas; over 70 green infrastructure projects; and over 270 community, culture and recreation projects. Also, as part of ICIP, Ontario launched the COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure stream with combined federal and provincial funding of \$1.05 billion. This includes up to \$250 million in federal and provincial funding for municipalities to address critical local infrastructure needs to improve health and safety.

Dear Mayor MITCHELL SELWYN

Climate change is here.

The dangerously high temperatures we saw in B.C. recently claimed the lives of more than 700 people, who died during the extreme heatwave. That same week, the B.C. community of Lytton, and people living on surrounding Nlaka'pamux First Nation territory and rural areas, became one of the hottest places on Earth, with a killing temperature of 49.5 C on June 29, 2021. The catastrophic fire that came subsequently burned down this B.C. village.

The climate emergency is the most pressing challenge of our time – Indigenous people and other impacted front-line communities are experiencing the impacts of the climate crisis often far more profoundly than other communities.

As the planet warms, the pathway to net zero by 2050 is narrow but clear. We must raise our ambitions and spend more time working to solve the climate emergency by curbing the drivers of climate change and putting forward proposals for a clear path to resolving the climate crisis. Science and indigenous knowledge provide a complex understanding about how to address the climate crisis and it is critical for developing a climate emergency action framework.

We need to supercharge our climate action ambitions now to reduce emissions, close the socioeconomic gaps and ramp up the shift toward a clean energy low-carbon economy. I need your help to make a greater impact for this change on the federal government, as we continue to impress upon them the need for Canada to act with urgency to address the climate crisis and the growing socio-economic inequalities at the same time.

Here are two legislative tools that I've proposed in Parliament to get us to where we need to go in helping us to resolve these intersectional crises with the urgency with which we must act:

<u>Motion M-1 for a Green New Deal</u> and <u>Motion M-94</u> to stop the Trans Mountain pipeline project.

I am seeking your endorsement of these legislative initiatives.

We know the next 10 years are the most critical to fighting the climate crisis. The world's top scientists are telling us we must dramatically reduce our emissions if we want to avoid the worst consequences of severe climate change. Canada, and other industrialized countries, must plan to drastically scale back fossil fuels and not build any new oil, gas or coal infrastructure.

Recently, an unprecedented decision by the International Energy Agency (IEA) recommended no new fossil fuel infrastructure if we're to avoid catastrophic climate change.

We need to examine what that means now for Canada's climate and energy policies going forward, including plans for the Trans Mountain pipeline expansion project, which contradict the Trudeau government's own climate plans. Canada must immediately stop the construction of the TMX pipeline as outlined in M-94 and instead invest in a Green New Deal.

According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), building a world that can thrive will require "rapid, far-reaching and unprecedented changes in all aspects of society." The IPCC estimates that for the global economy to move onto a viable climate stabilization path, global emissions of carbon dioxide (CO2) will have to fall by 45 percent as of 2030 and be at zero emissions by 2050.

M-1 would promote a reorientation of our economy to consider the needs of the climate emergency we are facing. The investments required in the Green New Deal framework would, by necessity, require every level of governments to adopt a range of socio-economic and energy-efficiency policies. The Green New Deal advocates that the issues related to the climate crisis are also social, referring to economic inequalities, lack of job security and the rise of racism and xenophobia. A fair and just made-in-Canada Green New Deal, includes required public investments in key sectors such as clean and renewable energy, energy retrofit buildings, sustainable public transit, sustainable agriculture and water systems, health care, affordable housing, education, childcare and more.

Our ultimate goal is to move quickly and actively address the issues addressed in these motions by growing our national campaign to get M-1 and M-94 adopted in Canada's Parliament. This would lead to the production of a number of Bills to enact those measures and as a result real transformational change where no one is left behind, as we turn our focus away from fossil fuels and on investing in clean renewable energy and a more just economy to avert climate catastrophe, where no one is left behind.

It is still achievable if governments act now and fast as extreme weather events become increasingly common. We are in a climate emergency. Canada's climate is warming twice as fast as the global average. The Arctic is currently warming two to three times faster than the rest of the globe. It's clear there's no time to waste. We are on perilous ground and have a duty to act to address climate change.

Thank you for your careful consideration of this matter. I urge you to join the call of the many who have endorsed these important legislative initiatives. Please let me know if you have questions at all. I hope to receive your endorsement.

I look forward to hearing from you soon.

### **Burleigh Falls Dam Replacement-Construction Update**

Trent-Severn Waterway National Historic Site

**July 23, 2021, Peterborough, ON** – Parks Canada advises that the Burleigh Falls Dam replacement project has been deferred until further notice.

While the dam is in poor condition and is in need of replacement, recent engineering inspections have concluded that the dam does not pose any imminent risk to public safety. Parks Canada will continue to monitor the dam in the interest of public safety and actively address any issues.

In the interim, Parks Canada will continue work on Indigenous consultations and stakeholder engagement related to the project, the supporting baseline environmental studies and the completion of the Detailed Impact Assessment and fisheries plan.

The Government of Canada is investing over \$615 million to support infrastructure work on the Trent-Severn Waterway as part of the largest federal infrastructure plan in the history of Parks Canada.





#### Overview

This report is intended to provide Council with a summary of a public survey that was recently conducted in relation to the County Official Plan Project.

### **Background**

This was the second in a three-part survey series aimed at obtaining feedback from the community about issues that may be important to them. The survey was developed through a working sub-group of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and was vetted through the TAC prior to being released publicly. The surveys have been designed to seek input on how our community members Live, Work and Play in the County of Peterborough.

Survey123, an application available under the County's existing ArcGIS licence, was the platform used to undertake the survey and generate the following analysis. The survey was primarily advertised digitally through social media, the County website and compiled notification lists. In addition to County Council circulation via email, a total of 195 addresses were circulated directly through website subscriptions and notification lists, and over 2,300 unique users were reached through social media. Local Municipal staff assisted by sharing the information through their own social media profiles and may have circulated it directly to their own Councils and notification lists. Hard copies of the survey were available upon request.



#### **Analysis**

This second survey, relating to how people work in the County, where new employment uses should be located and how to improve our downtown areas, was open for two weeks from May 21<sup>st</sup> through to June 4<sup>th</sup>, 2021. A total of 238 responses were received during this time period. The raw survey results are attached as Appendix A to this report.

Responses from people in each Municipality were distributed more evenly for this survey than in the previous survey, and over 40% of those responses were from people who identified as living or owning property in a rural area. Over 80% of those who took the survey were aged 40 and up.

In order to gauge community knowledge about the planning process and whether they have dealt directly with an Official Plan prior to engaging in this process, we asked what an Official Plan (OP) is and whether people have had prior experience with an OP through Planning Act applications. Most respondents correctly identified an Official Plan as a policy document that guides long-term development in the community but had no prior experience with an OP through Planning Act applications such as severances or Zoning By-Law Amendments.

### **Current Employment Status**

In order to gauge the perspective of survey respondents, this survey included a section on the current employment status of the individual. The results found that most respondents were almost evenly split between retirees and those currently working in the County of Peterborough. Of those that indicated that they were employed, most respondents said that they work close to home (a commute time of 30 minutes or less), and are in government, small business, construction or trades, education, real estate or finance.

### Agricultural Sector

The County of Peterborough is fortunate to have hundreds of acres of productive agricultural land and an active farming community. For this reason, the survey asked respondents how agricultural lands can be protected for the future while also allowing farmers flexibility in their business operations.

Over 85% of respondents indicated that the agricultural land use designation should be expanded to better reflect existing farm operations and protect them from incompatible uses. The same question was asked as part of our first survey, and the level of support for recognizing and protecting agricultural areas has remained very strong.

When asked which uses should be permitted as on-farm diversified uses, uses such as farm market or food store, agri-tourism uses, farmstays, winery/cidery/microbrewery, and bakery appear to be most popular, with a variety of other uses also supported.



Knowing that the cannabis industry is on the rise and that it is often a controversial subject, the survey asked respondents if cannabis should be a permitted use in prime agricultural areas. 38% of respondents agreed that it should be permitted in agricultural areas, while an additional 30% remained neutral on the subject. When asked if cannabis should be grown indoors, outdoors or both, over 55% of people felt it should be permitted to be grown both indoors and outdoors, although the vast majority also felt there should be a specific separation distance from other land uses. A number of concerns with cannabis operations were identified by members of the public including increased crime (both at the site and on neighbouring properties), odour, personal safety, decreased property values, impact on water supply and loss of prime farmland. Cannabis operations were seen by most as a business that brings employment opportunities to the community.

Going forward it will be important to provide clear direction for both on-farm diversified uses and cannabis operations, so that the lands remain protected for local food supply but also flexible enough to permit some additional uses that farmers can utilize to raise the profile of their farming operation. Given the concerns with cannabis operations, it seems reasonable to require some level of planning approval and public notification, rather than allowing this type of use as-of-right.


#### **Downtowns**

The survey included a section that explored local shopping habits and sought opportunities to maintain or improve the economic vitality in the downtown area of the County's hamlets, villages and settlement areas.

Most respondents consider the City of Peterborough as their nearest downtown, with Lakefield, Millbrook, Norwood, Apsley and Buckhorn following. Some also identified settlement areas outside the County such as Campbellford, Port Hope and Belleville. It is interesting to note that although the majority of respondents are retired or work in the County of Peterborough, most are still going to the City or consider the City their nearest downtown for shopping purposes. Some comments that were submitted indicate that locally owned businesses are well supported, but the shopping habits were also influenced by the needs of the consumer. Not surprisingly, if a local shop or settlement area did not meet the needs of the respondent, they would go to a larger centre. That said, respondents were overwhelmingly against big box retail, preferring instead to keep a 'small town feel'.

The bar graph below illustrates the types of businesses people would like to see in their downtowns:





As can be seen in the graph, locally owned specialty shops, restaurants, grocery stores, and healthcare are ranked the highest. Other suggestions from respondents included professional services (legal, accounting, or insurance offices for example), pet stores and veterinary offices, family clothing stores and discount stores (dollar store). One interesting suggestion was an entrepreneurial park for small businesses or artisans. We have heard from local Municipal staff that transitioning from a home occupation to a storefront can be difficult, but an entrepreneurial park may be a viable step to assist in that transition. Although we don't yet know the lasting impacts of the pandemic, it is likely that working from home could continue for many people, and having access to a shared meeting or office space may also be useful for those that wish to meet clients in a neutral space outside of their home or an uninterrupted space for phone calls or virtual meetings.

The survey asked respondents how downtown business areas in the County's settlement areas could be improved and the following suggestions ranked highest:

- 1. Greater variety of businesses
- 2. Storefront improvements and curb appeal
- 3. Pedestrian friendly improvements (crosswalks, sidewalks, benches/rest areas etc.)
- 4. Accessibility improvements (serving all ages and abilities)

Other suggestions made by respondents include active transportation infrastructure (cycling lanes, bike racks, links to existing trail systems), and streetscaping for climate change (trees for shade cover, low impact designs, promoting active transportation).

It should be noted that the Official Plan cannot require Municipalities to retrofit infrastructure or require an existing business to make storefront improvements. However, these are criteria that can be considered at the time of a new development application and planning tools such as subdivision agreements or site plan control, can guide the physical construction that takes place at a site. This information may also be useful in the



preparation of other Municipal tools or plans including Community Improvement Plans or Transportation/Active Transportation Master Plans.

#### **Tourism**

Recognizing that the tourism industry plays a large role in the local economy, the survey included a section that sought to find out what respondents enjoy in the area and where there may be future opportunities.

Over 50% of respondents indicated that the area needs more tourist attractions or recreational opportunities. When asked what types of attractions or opportunities are needed, the top response was split quite evenly between recreational trails and seasonal fairs or festivals. These were followed by music festivals. These suggestions do not necessarily need planning approval through the Official Plan as it is likely there are existing spaces where these activities could take place. However, the new Official Plan could include more permissive language to permit passive recreational trails in some land use designations where it may be appropriate.


### **Employment and Industry**

Given our proximity to the Greater Toronto Area (GTA), a network of major transportation routes including Provincial highways, rail lines and a local airport, and a generally lower cost of living compared to the GTA, the County is well-positioned to see employment growth in the future. The survey sought the public's opinion on what employment growth should look like and where it should take place.

Most respondents (over 70%) felt that new employment uses should be located near major roads or transportation corridors regardless as to whether they are located in a rural area or in a settlement area. However, the Provincial Growth Plan suggests that Municipalities should designate employment lands within settlement areas that are located near primary transportation corridors, haul routes, freight facilities, airports and the like. Employments lands in settlement areas, particularly serviced settlement areas, are prime lands since they are not necessarily constrained by private servicing and can benefit from being in close proximity to other related or supportive businesses. It is recognized however, that some employment uses with lower water and sewage servicing demands may be more suited to being located in a rural area.

The following graph shows which uses were most supported when asked what uses should be permitted in our designated employment areas:





Research and development, light industry, manufacturing, professional/corporate offices and warehousing were all strongly supported. Indoor cannabis cultivation and processing, which is sometimes seen as an industrial use, was not supported as strongly. This could be because the cannabis industry itself is comparatively quite new, and many have concerns with these types of facilities (as outlined in the Agriculture section earlier in this report).

In order to provide the best support to the regional economy, it will be important to permit a variety of uses in our designated employment areas in the new Official Plan and have those lands located in close proximity to transportation corridors so that their markets can easily be reached. The Growth Analysis and Land Needs Assessment that is currently underway will inform the amount of employment land that is needed across the County.

Once these lands are designated, it will be important to protect them from being converted into another use. When asked whether this was important, most survey respondents were neutral on the subject. However, the Growth Plan is quite clear that the conversion of employment areas to non-employment uses can only be done through a municipal comprehensive review, and a number of criteria must be met in order to do so.

What are the benefits of working in the County, or opportunities available for businesses? In closing, the survey asked respondents what the benefits were of working in the area, or what the opportunities were for businesses. Below is a word cloud based on answers that were received:





Our rural lifestyle, connection to nature and natural areas, and the opportunities presented by our transportation system, location between Ottawa and Toronto, and proximity to secondary education have all been highlighted as opportunities to be leveraged. As we identify employment areas it will be important to find areas that meet the needs of our communities and don't interfere with the natural spaces that we are known for.

### **Next Steps**

As of the date of writing this report, the three-part survey series (Live, Work and Play in the County of Peterborough) is coming to a close. The third and final survey will be ending on June 25<sup>th</sup>, and a future report to Council will summarize the findings. All comments and outcomes of the three surveys will inform the Technical Advisory Committee as policies are developed and reviewed.

All eight local Municipalities as well as Curve Lake and Hiawatha First Nations communities are represented on the Technical Advisory Committee and had the opportunity to provide input and feedback on the survey as it was developed.







## o If you live or own property in the County, what kind of area is the property in?





### ○ What age group are you in?







This report contains a summary review of customer responses related to recycling services received in the second quarter of 2021.

#### **Background**

The County of Peterborough provides curbside recycling services to over 24,000 households in the county through a contract with Emterra Environmental. Contracted services began on November 1, 2019 and include curbside recycling collection and processing of recyclable materials at the City material recovery facility (MRF).

At the August 4, 2020 Council Meeting, County staff were directed to prepare quarterly reports to Council on how many homes were not serviced or refused curbside blue box recycling service in each township.

#### **Analysis**

From January 1, 2021 to March 31, 2021, the County and Emterra Environmental received 271 total calls from residents. From April 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021, the County and Emterra Environmental received a total of 280 calls from residents, averaging 4.4 calls per day and 22 calls per week. The average weekly call volume indicates that less than 0.01% of the approximately 24,000 households serviced under contract each week had called in to the County or Emterra with a question or complaint. The following figures provide a breakdown of these calls by month, call category, and township.




Figure 1. Total customer calls received by month




Figure 2. Total calls received by call category




Figure 3. A break-down of the calls received related to non-collection




Figure 4. Total customer calls received by Township
